2015 IFNA Award Nomination: Distinguished Partner in Health Care Award

Nomination of Glen and Becky Taylor – The Glen Taylor Nursing Institute for Family and Society (http://ahn.mnsu.edu/nursing/institute/)

Glen and Becky Taylor of Taylor Corporation, Mankato, Minnesota, USA, are nominated for the 2015 IFNA Distinguished Partner in Health Care Award for their sustained investment and excellence in advancing family nursing and family focused health care.

Family nursing has a rich and storied history that began approximately four decades ago through the pioneering efforts of early family nursing clinicians, researchers, and educators. While there has been steady incremental growth in the development of family nursing science in many countries, the generous support of Glen and Becky Taylor has provided unprecedented opportunities for family nursing to grow exponentially and internationally.

Glen Taylor, an astute businessman and philanthropist, has grown the Taylor Corporation over 40 years from a single business to a large company with ownership in sports teams, banks, egg production, newspapers, and hearing devices (Brown, 2014). He has donated millions of dollars to his alma mater, Minnesota State University. In 2007, he married a nurse, Becky Mulvihill. In 2007, he also offered a special endowed fund to Minnesota State University, Mankato, for the development of new knowledge and innovation. The winner of the internal university-wide competition for this \$7 million endowment was the School of Nursing based on a brilliant application developed by faculty members, Dr. Sandra Eggenberger, and Dr. Sonja Meiers. The emphasis of their application was on advancement of *nursing practice* for health and healing of families and society. Becky Taylor's commitment to enhancing nursing and health care influenced the application that was chosen with the Taylors recognizing that nurses are more important now than ever to families' well being. In the history of family nursing, an endowed fund of this magnitude is unprecedented and the emphasis on *nursing practice with families* is significant.

In 2008, the School of Nursing at Minnesota State University, Mankato, launched The Glen Taylor Nursing Institute for Family and Society (http://ahn.mnsu.edu/nursing/institute/about.html) with Dr. Sandra Eggenberger as the Director and an Advisory Council which included Drs. Janice M. Bell, Kit Chesla, Sharon Denham, Naomi Ervin, Kathleen Knafl, and Patricia Tomlinson (Eggenberger, 2010). The mission of The Glen Taylor Nursing Institute for Family and Society is to focus on innovative *nursing practice* knowledge that influences the health and healing of families and society at local, state, national and international levels, and to provide leadership and expertise in family and society health related issues.

Over the past 5 years, The Glen Taylor Nursing Institute for Family and Society has been a major force for good in the international growth of family nursing and in the development of *family nursing practice* knowledge. Selected examples of the ways that The Glen Taylor Nursing Institute has contributed to this growth are highlighted below:

• Sustained financial support enabled the launch of the International Family Nursing Association in 2009 at the 9th International Family Nursing Conference.
