Member Updates on Current Research Projects	Lindsay new PhD candidate looking at Health Literacy in Nepali refugees in Tasmania, not a nurse but interesting as it is multidisciplinary. Health Literacy as a concept, dominated by medical on how individuals engage with the health system, like an individual blame game, from a bio sociological perspective—interested I how the family engages to help an individual be literate. Equity and such, but not health literacy as a construct. Suzanne will send contact info of Leah Walton who engages in health literacy. Wayne Neal at Children's national. Individuals do not stand alone it is informed by the context around them, i.e., family/community they know this much better than the system. Cindy has been working on her R21 grant finished as the funding is coming to an end to finish up. Sites are just starting to open since COVID as families were hesitant to come back. M.D were invited to present at a conference in China with 16,000 viewers to get family nursing out. Getting settle into working at her new job helping nurses and DNP students with their research and to get the family and policy piece. Seven nurse scientists at her facility who collaborate etc. QI lens is interpreted very differently across the country, so the Cleveland clinic is trying to help it be grounded in the evidence. QI is NO risk, not even low risk. When you are educating nurses on the floor students want to do pre/post education this introduces RISK, if you find out in the pretest and they are lacking in something and find out that posttest they are still lacking it could put them into a risk of being on their interventions. QI trying to introduce effective and safe health practice that should be in place but may not be in place. Looking at goals, i.e., immunization rates and trying to improve through education, i.e., chart review to look at percentages, and looking at the numbers. Needs assessment should not include pre/posttest. Hannah only does post evaluation with family sims because she wants to know what the family gets out of it. i.e., where do they think they are at, ranking 3 or 5 does not mean they did not get something out of it, they just need to review more. We want to measure a change but need to be careful about the pretest issue. Has time for writing. Producing new ideas for grants. She has been with Suja during her fellowship as well.

Suzanne suggested to Lindsay to do an IFNA blog about his work with the new student and the ideas of family context in Health literacy. Working with five from Japan with career cartography and working virtually on moving their career cartography forward.

Petra end of the semester for her. Established Africa IFNA chapter for now, later divide into regions. Three postdocs working on projects in Nigeria and S. Africa. Scoping review of family research in Africa, accepted by JAN. Knew there were gaps, but helped them to be more systematic in targeting the gaps going forward.
